Sunday's Services Today's Service

Resurrection Road: Jesus in the Driving Seat (Mark 8:27-38)

Mark's gospel has sometimes been described as a Passion narrative with a long introduction! For the first few chapters, we read a fast-paced account of Jesus' ministry involving great teaching, healings, miracles and wonders. The crowds following him have been asking increasingly, 'who is this man?' Now as Jesus reaches his furthest distance away from Jerusalem, Caesarea Philippi in the North, Peter declares Jesus to be the Messiah and Jesus reveals the suffering and death that must soon follow. The way of the cross leads to Jerusalem. As we consider our own journeys, how should we think about Jesus' demand that we deny ourselves, take up our own crosses and follow him? How do we put Jesus in the driving seat?

Isaiah 53: 1-6

Who has believed our message and to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed? ² He grew up before him like a tender shoot, and like a root out of dry ground. He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him. ³ He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain. Like one from whom people hide their faces he was despised, and we held him in low esteem. ⁴ Surely he took up our pain and bore our suffering, yet we considered him punished by God, stricken by him, and afflicted. ⁵ But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed. ⁶ We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to our own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

On the way he asked them, 'Who do people say I am?' ²⁸ They replied, 'Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets.'
