Today's Services

St John's Sunday

John was a remarkable character. He made the wilderness his home and lived a simple life, probably as part of the Essene community that rejected what they perceived to be the corrupt temple worship of the day. His message to the people was equally simple — repent! Israel had grown complacent, behaving in unjust ways. John told them in no uncertain terms that the Messiah was coming and God would act if they did not turn to him and start producing good fruit. There is much we can learn from John's courage and total commitment to God's truth.

Readings

Isaiah 40:3-8 Maggie Savill

A voice of one calling: 'In the wilderness prepare the way for the LORD make straight in the desert a highway for our God. ⁴ Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain. ⁵ And the glory of the LORD will be revealed, and all people will see it together. For the mouth of the LORD has spoken.' ⁶ A voice says, 'Cry out.' And I said, 'What shall I cry?' 'All people are like grass, and all their faithfulness is like the flowers of the field. ⁷ The grass withers and the flowers fall, because the breath of the LORD blows on them. Surely the people are grass. ⁸ The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures for ever.'

Luke 3:7-20 Rev. Geoff Andrew

⁷ John said to the crowds coming out to be baptised by him, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? 8 Produce fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not begin to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our father." For I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham. 9 The axe has been laid to the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire.' 10 'What should we do then?' the crowd asked. 11 John answered, 'Anyone who has two shirts should share with the one who has none, and anyone who has food should do the same.' 12 Even tax collectors came to be baptised. 'Teacher,' they asked, 'what should we do?' 13 'Don't collect any more than you are required to,' he told them. ¹⁴ Then some soldiers asked him, 'And what should we do?' He replied, 'Don't extort money and don't accuse people falsely - be content with your pay.' 15 The people were waiting expectantly and were all wondering in their hearts if John might possibly be the Messiah. 16 John answered them all, 'I baptise you

with water. But one who is more powerful than I will come, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. 17 His winnowing fork is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire. 18 And with many other words John exhorted the people and proclaimed the good news to them. 19 But when John rebuked Herod the tetrarch because of his marriage to Herodias, his brother's wife, and all the other evil things he had done, 20 Herod added this to them all: he locked John up in prison.
