A MESSAGE FROM REV. GEOFF ANDREW

I never cease to be amazed by the way that God provides. We finally had approval a few weeks ago to take 10 pews from the back of church. Our intention had always been to replace them with 40 stackable chairs, but of course this requires funding and our normal budget would have been stretched to find the additional £4,000 for the chairs and two trolleys. We decided therefore to wait for the right time to purchase the first 20 chairs. However, you may have noticed that we have already taken delivery of 20 chairs and one trolley. These were funded partially by the sale of the pews and partially by a one-off donation specifically given to us to put toward the chairs. The total we received was exactly what we needed to fund the first half of the project. Now, we want to give the church family an opportunity to contribute to the fund for the other 50%. You can find details of how to do this further on in the newsletter. But let's start with grateful thanks for the blessings we have already Rev. Geoff Andrew received.

CHAIR APPEAL

Today's Services

After last week's Harvest celebration, we are back to our Epic Tales sermon series again this week. Last time we looked at the Exodus and Israel's 40 years of wandering in the wilderness. This week we find the Israelites poised to finally enter the Promised Land. Their first challenge is how to overcome the fortified city of Jericho. The story of how Joshua and his army brought down the walls of the city are a lesson in faith, obedience and persistence in the face of adversity.

<u>Readings</u> Joshua 6:1-20

6 Now the gates of Jericho were securely barred because of the Israelites. No one went out and no one came in. ²Then the LORD said to Joshua, 'See, I have delivered Jericho into your hands, along with its king and its fighting men.³ March round the city once with all the armed men. Do this for six days. ⁴Make seven priests carry trumpets of rams' horns in front of the ark. On the seventh day, march round the city seven times, with the priests blowing the trumpets. ⁵ When you hear them sound a long blast on the trumpets, make the whole army give a loud shout; then the wall of the city will collapse and the army will go up, everyone straight in.' ⁶ So Joshua son of Nun called the priests and said to them, 'Take up the ark of the covenant of the LORD and make seven priests carry trumpets in front of it.' ⁷ And he ordered the army, 'Advance! March round the city, with an armed guard going ahead of the ark of the LORD.'⁸ When Joshua had spoken to the people, the seven priests carrying the seven trumpets before the LORD went forwards, blowing their trumpets, and the ark of the LORD's covenant followed them. 9 The armed guard marched ahead of the priests who blew the trumpets, and the rear guard followed the ark. All this time the trumpets were sounding. ¹⁰ But Joshua had commanded the army, 'Do not give a war cry, do not raise your voices, do not say a word until the day I tell you to shout. Then shout!' ¹¹ So he had the ark of the LORD carried round the city, circling it once. Then the army returned to camp and spent

the night there. ¹² Joshua got up early the next morning and the priests took up the ark of the LORD. 13 The seven priests carrying the seven trumpets went forwards, marching before the ark of the LORD and blowing the trumpets. The armed men went ahead of them and the rear guard followed the ark of the LORD, while the trumpets kept sounding. ¹⁴ So on the second day they marched round the city once and returned to the camp. They did this for six days. ¹⁵On the seventh day, they got up at daybreak and marched round the city seven times in the same manner, except that on that day they circled the city seven times. ¹⁶ The seventh time round, when the priests sounded the trumpet blast, Joshua commanded the army, 'Shout! For the LORD has given you the city! ¹⁷ The city and all that is in it are to be devoted^[a] to the LORD. Only Rahab the prostitute and all who are with her in her house shall be spared, because she hid the spies we sent. ¹⁸ But keep away from the devoted things, so that you will not bring about your own destruction by taking any of them. Otherwise you will make the camp of Israel liable to destruction and bring trouble on it. ¹⁹ All the silver and gold and the articles of bronze and iron are sacred to the LORD and must go into his treasury.' 20 When the trumpets sounded, the army shouted, and at the sound of the trumpet, when the men gave a loud shout, the wall collapsed; so everyone charged straight in, and they took the city.

Luke 5:1-7

5 One day as Jesus was standing by the Lake of Gennesaret, the people were crowding round him and listening to the word of God. ² He saw at the water's edge two boats, left there by the fishermen, who were washing their nets. ³ He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the people from the boat. ⁴ When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into deep water, and let down the nets for a catch.' ⁵ Simon answered, 'Master, we've worked hard all night and haven't caught anything. But because you say so, I will let down the nets.' ⁶ When they had done so, they caught such a large number of fish that their nets began to break. ⁷ So they signalled to their partners in the other boats so full that they began to sink.
